Too Many Lessees and Lessors.

For some time the hotel has been struggling hard to keep up appearances, but slowly and surely has it been sinking in the sea of insolvency. Every effort was made to cut down expenses and increase the revenues of the place, but to no avail. The reason for the downfall of the hotel may be assigned to the fact that too much was expected of it. One real estate firm owns the ground, the building is owned by another firm, which leases the ground from the first correction. from the first company. Ellis C. Freed owns the furniture of the hotel and leases the building from its owners, and in turn rents the hotel furnished to Mrs. H. D
