C. Nelson, state superintendent of public instruction, which was filed with Governor Cutler yesterday.

Large Percentage of Children.

There are only six states in the union that spend a greater amount per annum per capita for the education of the children of school age.

Too Many Interested.

The report recommends that the date for taking the school census be changed to the first and second weeks of October.

The new law requiring standard and uniform examinations for teachers has done much to eliminate unqualified teachers from the state.
